MISSION STATEMENT

The Bent County Fair is an annual event for the community and for the educational benefit of 4-H and FFA members. The fair gives our county youth an opportunity to exhibit their skills. The focus is on youth development—helping our youth gain the knowledge and life skills needed to become productive adults.

The Bent County Fair is also a time for the county to join in sharing and fun, a time for renewed community awareness and togetherness.

The Fair is planned and presented by a volunteer board appointed by the County Commissioners. Colorado State University Extension serves as educational advisors to the fair. The Bent County Fair Board welcomes any suggestions that would increase the educational value and success of the fair.

General Rules

1. All exhibitors, his, her or their parents or legal guardians participating in the Bent County Fair agree in advance as condition to participating as a contestant or exhibitor in any of the activities of the Bent County Fair, to be bound by the following rules of conduct adopted by the Bent County Fairboard.
2. Only 4-H or FFA members enrolled in Bent County are eligible for junior exhibits. 4-H exhibitors must be 8 years of age, and have not reached their 19th birthday, as of January 1 of the current year to compete. FFA exhibitors must be enrolled and active in an approved Vocational Agriculture High School program and not have reached their 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year. FFA and 4-H members must be enrolled with an existing project in Bent County, or be active in 4-H and FFA activities and club/chapter meetings to be eligible for competition at the Bent County Fair.
3. The Bent County Fair Board shall reserve the right to vacate as ineligible for competition, and order the removal of any entry, which has been entered in violation of rules set forth. Persons who are barred from competition at other fairs within Colorado may also be barred from competition at the Bent County Fair.
4. Every animal or article shall be entered and exhibited in the name of the bona fide owner.
5. It is the policy of the Bent County Fair to provide all persons the opportunity to exhibit at the fair without regard to race, creed, color, sex, age or other non-merit factors.
6. The Bent County Fair Management will use diligence to insure safety of exhibits after arrival and placement **but in no case will the Bent County Fair Authority be responsible for any loss, damage, or injury of any character to any property while on the grounds or at any time or place, nor be liable for or make any payment for the value thereof.** Official entry by the exhibitor shall be deemed acceptance of all rules and the exhibitor thereby indemnifies the Bent County Fair from any and all legal proceedings in regard thereto.

7. Junior exhibitors' record books must be complete or up to date, signed by their 4-H leader or FFA advisor, and given to the superintendent at entry time to be able to compete at the Bent County Fair.
8. Entry deadlines in all departments must be met or the project will be considered ineligible.
9. Awards and premiums will not be given where merit does not exist. The judge of each division will determine this. Judges decision will be final.
10. Any exhibitor removing their exhibit before release time without superintendent permission will forfeit their placing and premium money.
11. All premiums will be paid to the exhibitor at a set time to be stated in the current year Bent County Fair Schedule and pay out schedule will be determined yearly by the Bent County Fair Board.
12. Awards will be given provided there is a sponsor for that award. If there is no sponsor, there will be no award. Award selection will be given to each individual award winner. Only one belt buckle will be allowed per individual per year.
13. **The Decision of the Bent County Fair Board will be final. To appeal any such decision by the board, it must be submitted in writing, within 10 days of said decision, to the Board of County Commissioners, Bent County, Colorado.**

Protests: Unless otherwise stated in the Department Rules, three individuals must file a written and signed protest with the Bent County Fair Board within 24 hours after the occasion for a protest or alleged violation. The protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint and be accompanied by a \$150.00 cash deposit or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Upon receipt of a properly presented protest, the Bent County Fair Board President will appoint a committee of three disinterested, qualified persons to review the protest and render a decision, which shall be considered final. The full deposit will be refunded if protest is sustained. Neither a member of a review committee, the Bent County Fair Board or associated parties will be held liable for any decision or penalty invoked as a result of the protest. Judges decisions are final with no appeal considered.

Disputes: The Bent County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret the Rules and Regulations, and to arbitrarily settle questions of differences.

Judges: Judges are requested to read carefully the General Rules and Special Rules under the heading of the department in which they are to serve and to especially note those rules bearing on the classes to be adjudicated by them.

No person shall be allowed to interfere with judge or judges during their adjudication. Violators of this rule shall be excluded immediately from the judging area and possibly from all competition at the Bent County Fair.

The decision of judges shall be final, with no appeal considered.

General Livestock Rules

1. Exhibitors must accompany their livestock to the show, care for, and exhibit. If a 4-H or FFA exhibitor shows more than one animal in a class, he/she must have another Bent County Junior Livestock exhibitor show his/her other livestock (**NO CLOVERBUDS**). In case of sickness or other emergency, an animal may be shown by another junior exhibitor provided permission is granted by the Fair Board. The only valid non emergency reason for the exhibitor not to be present must be a direct 4-H or FFA related activity and must have prior approval of the Bent County Fair board. **In any other case that the exhibitor does not show the animal, another junior Bent County 4-H or FFA exhibitor can show the animal but it will not be eligible for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion or the Market Sale.**
2. **Project:** 4-H and FFA members will provide the primary, continuous care and preparation of their project animals from project beginning to completion. If assistance is provided, the 4-H or FFA member enrolled in the project must be present and participating to benefit from the teaching and instruction.
3. **Unethical Practices:** Unethical practices will not be tolerated. Unethical practices include but are not limited to the following: Tampering, in any manner such as changing, switching, or alteration of animal identification devices or markings, such as tattoos, ear tags; alteration, changing, defacing, or moderation of the marking of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal; use of any type of injections used for body “fill in”; any attempt to add or remove weight other than by natural ingestion or by natural eliminations; any unauthorized introduction or removal of animals to and from the fairgrounds. *No forced fluids/drenching will be allowed unless under supervision of licensed veterinarian. Animals that need medical treatment will be called to the attention of the superintendent and will be treated under the supervision of a veterinarian.* **Muzzles will be prohibited on all animals while stalled at the Bent County Fair.** The Bent County Fair Board may hear and decide any charges and allegations of unethical conduct, making determination upon each case on case by case basis. The integrity and public image of the Junior Livestock Show and Sale being the goal to be preserved, in each instance. Any exhibitor, and or any person acting in concern with or on behalf of any exhibitor, found guilty of any of the practices deemed unethical by the Bent County Fair Board will forfeit all premium monies and be barred from future participation in any livestock program, showing, or selling at the Bent County Fair.
4. **Endorsements:** The Bent County Fair Board endorses and supports the USDA Wholesome Meat Act and will insist that exhibitors be in compliance with said act. The Bent County Fair Board also endorses and supports Senate Bill 95-230, an act concerning unlawful alterations of livestock by tampering or sabotage. The Fair Board will insist that exhibitors be in compliance with said bill.
5. **Health Requirements:** All exhibitors must comply with the respective Livestock Health Requirements. All livestock will be carefully examined on arrival for evidence of infectious or contagious diseases and if such is found they will be removed from the grounds or held in quarantine and treated at the owner’s expense. Animals deemed unworthy of competition by the Superintendent may be barred from competition and removed from the fairgrounds.
6. **Diseased Animals:** Diseased animals cannot enter the Livestock Show area or grounds. Superintendents will refuse unloading privileges to animals showing signs and symptoms of disease.

7. **Water:** A water container, with fresh water, must be available in each penned/stalled area. Bent County Fair Officials reserve the right at their discretion to give water to any animal while on the Bent County Fairgrounds.
8. **Exhibitor Liability:** Exhibitors of livestock must exercise due discretion in regard to the animals they are exhibiting, whether in the ring, stall or pen and must assume all responsibility for any damages caused by or to their animals. He/she shall indemnify the Bent County Fair and its officials against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as any damage or injury to any other person or property caused by the exhibitor or any of the animals exhibited.
9. **Mandatory Showmanship:** All 4-H and FFA members exhibiting livestock at the Bent County Fair are required to participate in showmanship classes in each of their respective species unless excused by the superintendent. Members who have multiple species will show in showmanship classes for each species.
10. **Unruly Livestock:** Any livestock too unruly to handle are ineligible to compete and exhibitor will remove the animal from the Bent County Fairgrounds immediately.
11. **Livestock Ring:** Adults will not be allowed in the show ring, other than the judge and ring superintendents.
12. **Displayed Information:** Exhibitors are responsible for displaying information concerning their own animals.
12. **Tagged Market Animals:** The number of market animals that can be tagged for the Bent County Fair will be **unlimited**. All market animals must be ear tagged for ownership identification. This will be done at the designated tagging date and times. Each family is entitled to tag in one family animal per family per specie. Family animal must be specified at tag in and child exhibiting animal must be specified at county fair weigh-in. Youth specified at county fair weigh-in is the only child eligible to sell animal through the premium sale. Members must be enrolled in the project, and have tagged at least one animal as an individual to be eligible to show the family animal.
13. **Livestock Weights:** Exhibitors will be allowed to weigh each animal one time only to determine eligibility of animal for market class division and market sale weight. Entry weight will determine eligibility of animal for class. Weight classes will be split based upon weight and number of animals entered, after all entries are in. Classes of livestock will be added or canceled where the superintendent(s) feel such actions are necessary.
14. **Market Classes:** All market classes are only open to 4-H and FFA exhibitors enrolled in market animal projects. Animals shown in a market class are not eligible to compete in breeding classes. To be eligible for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion, there must be a minimum of 3 entries in each market species.
15. **Stalls:** **Stalls will be assigned by the superintendents.** Exhibitors, once they receive health inspection from superintendent(s), are allowed to stall animals before current entry weigh in. *See fair schedule for specific date and times.* A \$25.00 deposit will be required per exhibitor per species from each 4-H or FFA member before any animal is weighed in. The deposit will be paid to the SUPERINTENDENT(S). Once the stall is cleaned to the specification of the superintendent(s), the deposit will be refunded.

16. **Entries:** The superintendent(s) of each department will take responsibility of not accepting entries of any known infected or diseased animal. All livestock will be subject to test for drugs and may be eliminated from the show if the veterinarian or the Bent Count Fair Board so advises.
17. **Rules:** Livestock fair superintendent(s), after consulting with the Bent County Fair Board members or Extension Agent, may add additional rules in their department to improve the workability of the show or barn(s). Such rules must be posted prominently and clearly in their barns prior to entry and weigh in time.
18. **Training:** All 4-H and FFA members who are exhibiting market and/or breeding livestock projects and are ages 8, 11 or 14 or a first or second year showman, must attend a Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) program presented by their Vo-Ag instructor or by a CSU Extension Agent. All 4-H and FFA members who are exhibiting market and/or breeding livestock projects will sign a statement, via the Wholesome Meat Act Quality Assurance form, indicating their understanding and compliance with the Wholesome Meat Act and that they have complied with the Ten Good Production practices. Consequences for failing to comply with the Wholesome Meat Act/Rules of Competition/4-H Code of Conduct may result in removal from all 4-H livestock projects for the member/family.
19. **Livestock Release Time:** With the exception of the market sale animals and round robin livestock, other animals will be released according to the current year fair schedule. All livestock **must** have the superintendent(s) permission prior to being removed from the fairgrounds. Once livestock leaves the fair grounds they **will not** be allowed to return.

Junior Livestock Market Sale Rules

Bent County Junior Livestock Market Sale Committee

Mission:

The Bent County Junior Livestock Market Sale committee in conjunction with the Bent County Fair Board is committed to helping the Bent County 4-H and FFA members have a successful livestock sale by encouraging them to help themselves through advertising and marketing their projects. We believe that if we all work together as a team we can have the best sale possible.

Participation Requirements:

Each livestock exhibitor will be given at least 5 names to deliver **invitation verification forms to**. The exhibitors do not need to solicit or pick up money, just hand deliver an **invitation verification form** inviting prospective buyer to the fair and sale. The **invitation verification forms** will be provided by the committee. They are also asked to get a contact form signed, filled out, and returned to show proof they delivered their invitations. ***This is not mandatory but any exhibitor not fulfilling this requirement will not receive additional help or any monies from the sale committee.***

1. All stock offered for sale must have been entered and shown in their respective junior market classes at the Bent County Fair. The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market

Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat, Rabbits Meat Pen and Poultry Pen of Fryers must sell in this sale. Sellers will be limited to one animal, unless exhibitor qualifies with more than one of the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion animals.

2. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell one animal through the Junior Livestock sale if they choose. They may floor plan two additional animals per specie.
3. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to notify livestock superintendents as to which animal is intended for sale or to be floor planned immediately following the show, or no later than one hour after the last species show. No changes will be allowed after this deadline. This includes extra animals to be floor planned.
4. The sale order of all divisions will be Grand Champion first, Reserve Grand Champion second, and Rate of Gain third, Born and Raised Champion fourth, and the Beef division will also have High Placing Hereford fifth. All other animals will be sold according to their live placing. Each year the sale will rotate all species.
5. The entry weight will determine the sale weight. (Refer to each species for requirements.)
6. Junior Market exhibitors who qualify for the sale will be responsible for the care, custody, control, feeding, and watering of their animals daily until loaded for slaughter. Any exhibitor qualifying for the Junior Livestock Sale that does not complete their obligation to the care of their animal may be ineligible for sale and/or forfeit all awards, premiums, and sale monies acquired at the Bent County Fair. The exhibitor and his/her immediate family will be barred from showing any type of exhibit for a period of three years. This rule infraction may be reported to other show related entities as well.
7. All Junior Livestock Market Sale animals must be cleaned and/or groomed with accepted practices prior to entering the sale ring. No artificial decorations, signs, paint or glitter, etc. of any type will be permitted on any animal entering the sale ring. Show awards won are allowed. Violators of this rule will not be permitted to continue in the Livestock Sale.
8. If the exhibitor does not take the animal through the sale at the designated time, the animal will be ineligible to go through the sale, **regardless of placing**.
9. Buyer Pictures: Exhibitors pictures will be taken immediately after leaving the sale ring. They will be mounted on a mat and given to the buyer. **A 2% sale commission will be deducted from the exhibitors sale check.** This amount will pay for the buyer picture and the remaining amount will go for repairs and improvements on the fairgrounds.
10. Exhibitors with animals in the sale will be paid by check approximately four weeks following the sale. Sale will be clerked by the First National Bank of Las Animas.
11. If a buyer does not floor plan the animals, the buyer must make an arrangement with the seller to remove immediately. Market sale exhibitors are responsible for getting their animals to the packing-house according to arrangements made with the buyer. This applies only to animals purchased individually not floor planned.
12. In order to receive Livestock Premium Checks, exhibitors must turn in thank you notes for their buyer(s) and award sponsor(s) along with an up to date or completed record book to the Extension Office.

13. Exhibitors are responsible for getting their animals to the designated load out area at designated time. Exhibitors will not have to load out animals. Load out will be the responsibility of the livestock superintendents and the two designated fair board committee members.
14. Any animal that does not meet the minimum weight requirement will not be eligible for market sale or floor plan.

MANDATORY Livestock Showmanship

1. Showmanship contests will be held in conjunction with the Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Horse and Goat shows.
2. The exhibitor must show an animal he/she has entered at the Bent County Fair in the junior show competition.
3. All 4-H and FFA members exhibiting livestock at the Bent County Fair are required to participate in showmanship classes in each of their respective species unless excused by the superintendent. Members who have multiple species will show in showmanship classes for each species.
4. Exhibitors may win specific division as many times as they enter and are selected in the respective age category.
5. Superintendents of all livestock departments are in charge of their species at the round robin contest.

Round Robin Showmanship Contest

1. First and second place winners in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior division of the Showmanship contest in Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep, Goats and Horses will compete in the Round Robin Showmanship contest to be held after all classes have been judged. Showmanship winners must notify superintendent(s) if they are going to enter the Round Robin contest.
2. Animals used in the Round Robin contest must be the same animal used to win the species showmanship contest.
3. 4-H and FFA exhibitors must prepare their own animal with minimal assistance from parents or other adults.
4. Showmen competing for Grand Champion Showman will be required to show all classes of livestock. A system of using each other's animals and equipment for showing livestock will be used.
5. There will be 2 minutes allowed per division, with both showmen showing each animal for 1 minute.

6. Superior livestock handling and showmanship ability for each class of livestock will become the basis for selecting the Round Robin Showman.
7. Showman should always be ready to answer any questions on showing procedure asked by the judge.
8. Animals should not be released by one showman until it is controlled by the next showman.
9. Participants age division in the Showmanship Contest shall be:
 - Junior 8-10 years old
 - Intermediate 11-13 years old
 - Senior 14-18 years old(age as of January 1 of the current year.)
10. Exhibitor is required to wear appropriate clothing for the species they qualified with. Only horse showmen will wear a hat as it is appropriate only for that specie. Only Dairy showmen are expected to wear white. This clothing will be worn throughout entire Round Robin competition.
11. In case of a tie, a general livestock test will be given in each age division.
12. Superintendents of all livestock departments are in charge of their species at the Round Robin contest.

Beef

Superintendents: Keith and Teresa Garcia

Market Beef

1. Junior exhibitors must be enrolled in a Market Beef project in Bent County.
2. Market Beef entered at the Bent County Fair must have been ear-tagged and tattooed on the scheduled date. No late entries allowed. Ear tag and tattoo must be visible on the animal at the entry time of the Bent County Fair.
3. Market Steers must weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds and Market Heifers must weigh a minimum of 950 pounds to be eligible for Champion class and awards. No reweighs allowed.
4. Feeder Class is any calf under 1000 pounds and not eligible for the market sale or floor plan.
5. Maximum floor plan weight is 1400 lbs for beef.
6. Market beef exhibited in the junior division may not be more than 2 years of age at show date to be eligible to compete at the Bent County Fair. Age will be determined by the dental process. Evidence of eruption of any permanent incisors will declare animal to be ineligible. The Superintendents decision will be final. Certification of age is not acceptable.
7. To qualify for the Bent County Born and Raised Class the calf must have been born and raised in Bent County. Must have Brand Inspection for proof. Must designate at the beginning of the year beef weigh in. Can be either steer or heifer entered in the market beef show.

8. In order to enter a market beef project, exhibitor must turn in their record book, quality assurance statement and stall fee before their animal enters the scales. This needs to occur prior to the end of the weigh-in period.
9. Market Steer and Heifer Classes
 - Class 1-10 Steers and Heifers will be shown by weight. Steers and Heifers will be divided by sex into classes as determined appropriate by the Beef Superintendents. Heifers will compete equally with steers.
 - Class 11 Pen of three market animals from members of one 4-H Club/FFA chapter.
 - Class 12 Feeder Class (under 1000 lbs.)
 - Class 13 Bent County Born and Raised Class-must have been designated at tagging
10. Ownership identification for Market Beef:
 - a. All market beef animals must be ear-tagged and tattooed for ownership identification.
 - b. No market beef will be allowed to enter the Bent County Fair without the proper ear tag identification. Superintendents will be in charge of enforcing this.
11. All sale cattle must undergo brand inspection, time and date to be announced. The exhibitor must have proof of ownership (bill of sale) in his/her possession at that time to satisfy the brand laws of Colorado.
12. Ribbons awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
 - Award to Grand Champion Market Beef of the Show
 - Award to High Placing Market Heifer of the Show
 - Trophy to the Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef of the Show
 - Award for Market Beef Rate of Gain (Determination made on total gain of the animal)
 - Award for High Placing Market Hereford (straight bred) Determination made on total gain
 - Award for Bent County Born and Raised Champion Exhibitor
 - Award for Bent County Born and Raised Champion Breeder

Breeding Beef

1. Junior exhibitors must be enrolled in a Breeding Beef project in Bent County.
2. In order to enter a breeding beef project, exhibitor must turn in their record book, quality assurance statement and stall fee. This needs to occur prior to the end of the weigh-in period.
3. Market animals are not eligible to show in the Breeding Show.
4. Breeding Beef will be shown in classes split by breed if 3 animals are entered or at the Beef Superintendents discretion.
5. To be eligible for competition, beef breeding animals must have been the property of the exhibitor for no less than 120 days. Registration papers must accompany animals, cross breed excluded. Superintendents are responsible for checking registration papers.
6. Breeding Beef Classes:
 - a. Classes will be determined on the entries: Breed, Age, and Gender
 - b. Classes will be made for both Registered and Commercial cattle.
7. Ribbons awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
 - Award: Grand Champion Breeding Beef of the Show
 - Award: Champion Commercial Heifer of the Show

Beef Showmanship Contest

1. Showmanship contest open only to 4-H and FFA members exhibiting livestock at the Bent County Fair. Market or breeding animals are eligible. All exhibitors will participate.
2. Beef Showmanship Classes:
Class 1 Seniors
Class 2 Intermediates
Class 3 Juniors

Ribbons awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion. The top showman will receive a selected item.

Dairy Cattle

Superintendents: Keith and Teresa Garcia

1. Junior exhibitors must be enrolled in a Dairy project in Bent County.
2. In order to enter a dairy project, exhibitor must turn in their record book, quality assurance statement and stall fee. This needs to occur prior to the end of the weigh-in period.
3. Dairy will be shown in classes split by breed if 3 animals are entered or at the Dairy Superintendents discretion.
4. Dairy Classes:
Classes will be determined on the entries: Breed, Age, and Gender
5. Ribbons awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
Award: Grand Champion Dairy of the Show.

Dairy Showmanship Contest

1. Showmanship contest open only to 4-H and FFA members exhibiting livestock at the Bent County Fair. All exhibitors will participate.
2. Dairy Showmanship Classes:
Class 1 Seniors
Class 2 Intermediates
Class 3 Juniors

Ribbons awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion. The top showman will receive a selected item.

Tiny Tot Bucket Calf Class

Rules:

2. All calves must be orphans, which are bottle fed or bucket fed.
3. The bucket calves must have been born after March 1 and before June 15.
4. Calves will be shown at halter. Use of show sticks not allowed. No clipping can be done.
5. Calves are not eligible for the Livestock Market Sale.
6. All exhibitors will receive a participation ribbon and a donated prize.
7. Exhibitors do not have to be a 4-H Member (Cloverbud) to participate in this class.
8. Entries are due in the Extension Office by July 6, 2009.

1. All entries must comply with General Rules and Regulations, General Livestock Rules and Health Requirements set forth.
2. Junior Exhibitor must be enrolled in a Market Swine project in Bent County.
3. Junior Market Swine entering in the Bent County Fair must have been previously county ear tagged. If the animal was not previously tagged that Jr. Market Swine is not eligible to show at the Bent County Fair.
4. This show is not a terminal market show. Swine not selected for the sale will be released to the exhibitor.
5. All swine upon arrival will be checked for visible health problems.
6. Exhibitors are responsible to bed and clean their animal's stalls.
7. Market Swine will be shown from lightweight through heavyweight within divisions. Entry weight will determine class eligibility. Weight classes will be split based upon weight and number of animals entered, after all entries are in. Classes of livestock will be added or cancelled where the superintendents feel such actions are necessary.
8. The Bent County Fair reserves the right to RE-WEIGH any and all Market Swine, following exhibition in the show ring. Swine that deviate more than 5% from their official weight will be disqualified.
9. If exhibitor elects to sell, that exhibitor and his/her family must be familiar and comply with all Junior Livestock Sale Rules.
10. Market Swine must weigh over 225 to be eligible for champion classes.
11. Feeder Swine is any animal less than 225 lbs and will not be eligible for the market sale or floor plan.
12. Floor plan price will be paid to 280 lbs.
13. Swine entries must be free from excess amounts of mud and debris prior to weigh in time.

Breeding Swine

1. Junior exhibitors must be enrolled in a Breeding Swine project in Bent County.
2. All boars' tusks must be clipped before entering.
3. There must be at least 5 head in each breed or they will be classified together with other breeds.
4. Classes will be determined according to: Breed, Gender and Age.

Market Sheep

1. All entries must comply with the General Rules and Regulations, General Livestock rules, and Health Requirements set forth.
2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in a Market Lamb Project in Bent County.
3. Jr. Market Lambs entering in the Bent Count Fair must have been previously county ear tagged. If the animal was not previously tagged that Jr. Market Lamb is not eligible to show at the Bent County Fair.
4. This show is not a terminal market show. Lambs not selected for the sale will be released to the exhibitor.
5. All Lambs upon arrival will be checked for visible health problems. Any lamb showing signs of ringworm, sore mouth, or other contagious disease will be sent home immediately.
6. Any lamb showing evidence of prolapse will not be allowed to show.
7. Exhibitors are responsible to bed and clean their animal's stalls.
8. Purebred, grade or crossbred wethers or ewe lambs are eligible to show. All lambs must weigh a **minimum of 100 pounds** at weigh-in. **EXCEPTION:** Southdown lambs must weigh a minimum of 85 pounds. **Floor Plan on all Market Lambs will be paid to 140 pounds.**
9. Ewe lambs entered in the Market Classes are not eligible to show in the Breeding Sheep Classes. Male animals having one or both testicles contained in the body cavity are not eligible to show.
10. Market Lambs must be spring born, after January 1st of the current year, and be carrying all milk teeth. Lambs must be slick shorn at time of weigh-in. All lambs must be shorn, maximum ¼ inch wool from the knees and hocks up. Lambs must be shown without hairdressing compounds including oils, paints, powders, artificial coloring or other dressing, with NO belly wool. Violations may result in disqualification.
11. **NO MUZZLE** allowed while lambs are on fairgrounds. Violation will result in automatic disqualification.
12. Lambs will be shown from lightweight through heavyweight within divisions. Entry weight will determine class eligibility. Weight classes will be split based upon weight and number of animals entered, after all entries are in. Classes of livestock will be added or cancelled where the superintendents feel such actions are necessary.
13. The Bent County Fair reserves the right to RE-WEIGH any and all Market Lambs, following exhibition in the show ring. Lambs that deviate more than 5% from their official weight will be disqualified.
14. In all Market Lamb classes the front feet of the sheep must remain on the show ring floor while being shown. Judges and Superintendents will have discretion to enforce disqualification.
15. If exhibitor elects to sell, that exhibitor and his/her family must be familiar and comply with all Junior Livestock Sale Rules.
16. Exhibitors will be able to sell one lamb through the Junior Livestock Sale if they choose and floor plan two additional lambs. No more than three lambs per exhibitor will be marketed through the Bent County Fair. Additional lambs entered must be taken home at time of release.

Breeding Sheep

1. Junior exhibitor must be enrolled in a Breeding Sheep project in Bent County.
2. Flock – one ram (any age), two yearling ewes and two ewe lambs.
3. All Breeding Sheep will be inspected for general health. Any found showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases will be rejected.
4. Sheep entered in lamb classes must have all lamb teeth in place. Those entered in yearling classes may have two or four permanent teeth.
5. All Junior Breeding Sheep must have Scrapie Premise ID tags. Do not cut out any Scrapie identification tags.

Classifications:

Suffolk, Southdown, Hampshire, Columbia, Wether Sire/Dam, Rambouillet

There must be at least five head in each breed or they will be classified together with other wool breed, or meat breed classes.

Age:

Ram or ewe lambborn after January 1 of current year.

4. White clothing is required.
5. The exhibitors are to use only COLLARS or CHAINS in the show ring.
6. Dairy goats must be slick shorn to the hooves, excluding the tail switch.
7. No billies over the age of one (1) year.
8. All freshened dairy goats are to be shown in the milk (with a full udder).
9. Animals must be owned for 90 days prior to show.

All classes are to be broken by age, sex and number of entries, not by breed. First and second place animals will return for the selection of the overall Champion and Reserve Champion.

5. Exhibitors are to use only COLLARS or CHAINS in the show ring.
6. Animals are not to be body clipped. Long guard hair may be removed. The long tail and foot hair shall be removed. The inside of the ears should be clipped to ease tattoo reading. The hooves shall be trimmed and shaped to enable the animal to walk correctly and stand naturally. Horns shall not be colored. If the animal was disbudded or dehorned, it should be done neatly. Any scurs should be trimmed and safe.
7. Mature bucks will be allowed.
8. Animals must be owned 90 days prior to show.

All classes are to be broken by age, sex and number of entries. First and second place animals will return for the selection of the overall Champion and Reserve Champion.

Bent County Born and Raised Futurity

This class is designed to exhibit the specified goat(s) for three years. Goat must be kid when entered; exhibitor may enter animal(s) every year but have completed the three year requirement to compete for the grand prize. Classes will break to year of entry. The animal will be shown as a kid the year of birth, as a bred or dry doe the following year, and as bred or having given birth the third year. Award ribbons and premiums will be given each year, the grand prize of a Silver Trophy Plate and 100 dollars cash will be given to the Grand Champion during the final show of the third year. Reserve Champion will receive a Silver Trophy plate. Judges decision will be final.

1. Entries due at Market Goat tagging. Animal must brought to tagging the first year of entry.
2. Entry must be spring kid(s) at time of entry.
3. Entry must have legible tattoo or be given one at time of entry.
4. One goat or more can be entered.
5. Exhibitor may enter animal(s) every year.

Market Goats

1. Must be enrolled in the Bent County Market Goat program.
2. Market Wether or Doe must weigh a minimum of 60 lbs.
3. There is not a maximum weight limit for goats; the judge will select goats for placing based on the size in demand by packers and consumers.
4. Floor plan will be paid to 100 lbs.
5. Market goats must carry all milk teeth in normal conditions, spring kids recommended for weighing in. Goats showing either or both of the first pair of permanent incisors will be disqualified.
6. All market goats must be dehorned; having horns will result in a disqualification. (No scurs exceeding one (1) inch are allowed.)
7. Before weigh-in, all goats must be shorn slick (with no indication of blocking) to the skin above the knee and hock joints, excluding the tail switch.
8. NO paint, powder or any artificial coloring may be used on goats. Any goats having any external parasites will be disqualified and removed from the grounds.
9. ALL MARKET GOATS MUST BE SHOWN WITH A COLLAR OR CHAINS. NO BRACING of the goat will be allowed.
10. Removal of horns or scurs is not allowed on grounds.

BENT COUNTY FAIR JUNIOR RODEO

1. **Eligibility:** Only residents of Bent County are eligible to participate in the Junior Rodeo. They must live with a parent/guardian in Bent County for at least the months of May, June and July of the current year to be eligible.
2. **Entries:** Entries will be taken by rodeo secretary. See current year schedule for date and times.
3. **Entry Fee:** Entry fees will be \$2.00 per event and will be paid when entry forms are completed. **No refunds** will be made on entry fees paid.
4. Age will be determined as of January 1 of the current year. If there is a question of age the Bent County Fair Board may request a birth certificate before the award is given.
 - a. **Div I** ages 8 and under
 - b. **Div II** ages 9 to 12
 - c. **Div III** ages 13 to 18
5. **Events:** The events will include the following: Barrel Race, Goat Tying, Pole Bending and Flag Race.
6. **Awards:** There will be High Point Winner per division regardless of male or female. The purse will be jackpot 40-30-20 per division events.
7. **Safety:** All precautions will be taken to ensure the safety of the contestants and spectators. Hazardous conditions will not be permitted in the arena or on the grounds.
 - a. Any child under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent/guardian and parent/guardian must sign a permission form before the child can compete.

- b. **Warning** under the Colorado Law, an equine professional is not liable for an injury to or death of a participant in an equine activity resulting from the inherent risk of equine activities pursuant to section 13-2-1-119, CRS.
- c. No running horses through the gate. If a contestant runs the horse through the gate the contestant will receive a “no time”.

Ground Rules for All Events:

1. Contestants will only be called to perform three times. If they are not in the ring by that time, they will be disqualified.
2. A hat and long sleeve shirt are mandatory.
3. Div II and Div III will receive a two minute time limit
4. A contestant will not be married nor have children to compete.

Barrel Race:

1. There will be a two minute time limit for Div II and Div III.
2. Contestants leaves the score line with either right or left barrel first, but must make the first turn to the right and then two left turns or first turn to the left and then two turns to the right.
3. Contestants will receive a 5 second penalty for each knocked down barrel.
4. Contestants will be disqualified for the following:
 - a. Re-crossing the start/finish line before completing the pattern
 - b. Breaking the pattern
5. Should a barrel fall after the contestant crosses the finish line, time will hold and the run will be considered qualified.
6. The standard cloverleaf barrel pattern will be as follows:
 - a. 15 yards from barrels 1 and 2 to score line
 - b. 35 yards from barrels 1 and 2
 - c. 40 yards between barrels 1 and 3 and 40 yards between barrel 2 and 3

Pole Bending:

1. There will be a two minute time limit for Div II and Div III.
2. Contestants may start either to the right or the left of the pole and then run the rest of pattern accordingly.
3. Contestants will receive a 5 second penalty for each knocked down pole.
4. Contestants will be disqualified for the following
 - a. Re-crossing the start/finish line before completing the pattern
 - b. Breaking the pattern.
5. The standard pole bending pattern will be as follows:
 - a. Six poles will be used
 - b. Each pole is 21 feet apart
 - c. The first pole is to be 21 feet from the starting line.

Flag Race:

1. There will be a two minute time limit for Div II and Div III.
2. Contestants may run the course either to the right or left side; in either case, the bucket on the first barrel is empty and the second bucket contains the flag. The contestant is given a flag at the starting line, races to the barrel with empty bucket; deposits the flag in the bucket, races to the other bucket containing the flag, retrieves the flag and races back the finish line.
3. Contestants will not be disqualified for circling around the barrel.
4. Contestants will be disqualified for:
 - a. Knocking over the barrel
 - b. Crossing the finish line without the flag
 - c. Using the flag as a whip.
5. If a contestant in the race breaks a flag and the broken part remains in the bucket, that contestant receives time. If the broken piece falls out, there will be a no time.
6. The standard flag pattern is as follows:
 - a. Barrels are 100 ft, from the starting line
 - b. Barrels are placed no less than 25 ft apart.

Goat Tying:

1. There will be a two minute time limit for Div II and Div III.
2. Contestants leaves the score line with a running start, races to goat staked 40 yards away on a 10 ft rope, dismounts, throws goat by hand, crosses and ties any three feet. The horse does not have to be tied to a ring.
 - a. Contestant goes down rope
 - b. If the goat is down, it must be brought to its feet and then thrown
 - c. Piggin' string or goat thong may be used to tie with.
3. Goat must be held by official, facing starting line, at the farthest point away from contestant and must be released as starting flag drops.
4. Contestants will signal time by throwing BOTH hands in the air. If the contestant goes back to string after signaling time, the contestant will be disqualified.
5. The tie must hold for five seconds after the contestant has cleared the goat.
 - a. Contestants cannot touch the tie after signaling a complete time.
 - b. If the goat kicks free or gets to its feet before time has been ruled fair, contestant will be given a "no-time"
 - c. The horse may not interfere with the goat or the rope staked to the goat or the contestant will be disqualified.

THE BENT COUNTY FAIR BOARD HAS THE AUTHORITY TO CHANGE ANY OF THE RULES UPON GOOD JUDGEMENT. RULE CHANGES MUST BE POSTED PRIOR TO THE JUNIOR RODEO STARTING TIME.
